What I appreciate about a Hillerman novel is true in this bestseller: a crafty mystery, a picture of Navajo culture, and a pleasing romance. He depicts the wrongs of the Washington bureaucracy in dealing with First Nation promises, yet balances that with characters noteworthy for their humor and wisdom.

Was the unidentified victim's death a "hunting accident"? Is there a conspiracy within the local and state government? You will find out in just 300 pages, a good two-day read for me.

Hillerman has written over thirty mystery novels set in New Mexico, plus non-fiction books on the Rio Grande, New Mexico, and more related to the southwest where my great-grandfather mined for silver. But that's a story I could tell you about...

He starts planning in September to have all ready by Thanksgiving. (This year he's updating all of the lights to LED). Just after Thanksgiving, John calls and a team of 8-10 people spring into action, transforming our park into a wonderland. But, let's not forget about Sharman. She continued working after John retired and worked in the Finance Department for the City of Lakeland. Her department handled all billing for water, sewer, storm water, etc. All but electricity. She has retired now, but due to her contacts with the city, she is able to keep on top of the water and sewer bills and assists with the calculation for the amount we will be charged every year, in concert with the Statutory Committee.

Sharman has served 4 years on the HOA Board as Secretary. She also keeps the Library in tip-top shape and assists with the Line Dancing program.

Well, what do they do every day? John has a magnificent shop where he retreats every day, tinkering on various projects like repairing stuff for residents or fabricating something new for the Christmas lights. Sharman says she likes to read and shop! They like to play cards and are often found playing Hand and Foot.

They have a daughter and two grandchildren here in Lakeland which also fills their time. If you haven't yet met them, stop and say HI! They'd love to meet you.
