## **BT Volunteers Offer Assistance During COVID-19 Crisis**

During this time of the Covid-19 health crisis, Beacon Terrace has a group of volunteers that would like to offer assistance to anyone who feels they need it. The team consists of your neighbors and will help you with certain tasks so you can avoid larger groups. Shopping for home needs and medications are the two greatest needs we all require and also the greatest risk of contact.

Many of our local stores and pharmacies will now deliver items such as medications, food, and home supplies directly to your residence. Many at little to no cost. Some of the same stores have home shopping programs that allow you to order these items for pick up outside the store thus minimizing contact with others. If you do not have or cannot arrange transportation to the store, we will assist you.

I would advise those of you who feel concerned about coming in contact with others to use these free programs to obtain your home necessities. If you feel you do not understand how to do this, or do not have a computer to do it, we will assist you. I have found these free services to be relatively easy to do and totally effective in limiting contact with others in a store setting. You will need a credit card to pay for the items, so no contact is required at the store to complete the sale.

This is highly unfortunate, but deemed critical to reduce the possibility of sharing the Covid-19 virus with our friends and residents. Each of us finds this a challenge, but one we must face and hopefully we can get to a future point where this will no longer be required. It comes at a time where many of our seasonal friends will be returning to their summer homes without the chance to share many of the experiences, they, and we were looking forward to. Many things have been accomplished during the last month. Of course, I must begin with the annual Bazaar.

On Tuesday evening, a group of volunteers clears the Clubhouse to be ready to accept all the goods donated from all you residents. These goods completely fill up two large truck containers and other buildings. Early Wednesday morning dozens of volunteers completely empty the containers into the Clubhouse and continue to pick up addition donated items. This all occurs within about four hours.

If you came to the Clubhouse at 11 am Wednesday, you would not believe the huge collection of various items strewn all over the Clubhouse and outside the back door. That's when the volunteer ants take over. The ladies and men draw on their many years of experience and begin their organizing duties separating and categorizing the huge amount of donations into various locations in preparation for Thursday, which begins by 9 am.

Thursday the organizing continues and culminates with a completely organized, finely structured room with pricing completed on the majority of the items. Once organized, this takes less time than one may think being totally complete by Friday morning. I handle the electronics area, so from my viewpoint at the north end of the building, I can see virtually everything transpiring in front of my eyes. I find it absolutely amazing how efficient the volunteers go about their business with each one somehow knowing what needs to be done and they just do it! They transform the apparent confusion of Wednesday morning into a very functional shopping experience for all residents and others from the Lakeland area. Once the shopping days conclude on Saturday at noon, that is when the final highly organized function occurs...Cleanup.

I spent many years in the military, but nothing there compares to how efficiently the crew removes all the left over items, which are separated and donated to various organizations, vacuums all the carpeting, cleans the wood floor, and reinstalls all the furniture removed Tuesday evening, AND does it all within one hour. That can only be done by people who work so well together and are so coordinated that it brings tears to my eyes. I am so proud of being a part of this group. I wish those of you who read this think about volunteering next year. It is by far one fantastic experience.

If you have been down the Nature Trail recently you would notice the trail is now much smoother and contains new vegetation in many locations. Thanks go out to the men who distributed and smoothed out the sand piles on many areas of the trail including the hill near the compound. Thanks also goes out to Billie Lindsay who has taken the lead on making the trail more beautiful. If you frequent the trail, consider taking a little time to water some of the plants. Also, if you have plants that you would like to donate, please contact Billie (lot 194) and she will find a new home for them. We also have a memorial area about half way down the trail which will soon have a bench for refection.



## A Letter from the HOA President During the COVID-19 Crisis

Beacon Terrace Residents.

During these challenging times we all face disruptions to our daily activities. Many of us are retired and have become accustomed to our relaxed and comfortable lifestyles. We have daily schedules that included activities that are now being restricted due to mandates that have been established to slow the possible spread of the Covid-19 virus. I am writing this because this issue of The Beacon covers the months of April and May and we have no idea how long this will last.

Historically, the best way to suppress the spread of a contagious virus, for which there is no know cure, is to reduce contact. Today we call it "Social Distancing". That sounds like something that is voluntary and self-controlled, yet it is absolutely mandatory to prevent contact with those who may have been exposed and don't realize it. I know you are all educated people who understand this, and I believe to date, none of us has been infected, but we all go out into the public sector to do necessary activities, so we are suspectable to contact with those who have. That is why the Clubhouse and pool are locked. Just imagine what could occur if one of the residents unknowingly became infected and touched anything within the Clubhouse or pool. They could inadvertently share it with others who became sick. We are all in the age bracket that is most susceptible to infection.

I find this time eerily similar to what many of us remember as the Polio epidemic of the 1950's. Think back, remember what occurred then. Schools were closed, services were locked out, and literally millions of people were infected and died before a cure was developed. That was in a time where communication was greatly limited compared to today. This virus is very contagious, but it was identified very quickly and controls began immediately in this country., unlike with Polio. If we follow Social Distancing and other recommendations, the effect of the virus will be greatly decreased.

This current crisis involves everyone, including local government services. Basically, all local services, (libraries, pools, parks, etc.) besides police and emergency medical care have been affected. Lakeland Services, your electrical and sanitary services still operate, but with restricted contact with customers. Surprisingly, there are still many golf courses open to the public with restricted amenities, such as closed or restricted dining areas. This too may change.

The timing of this crisis could not have been worse for those of us who wish we could have had the pool repaired during this time. It sounds like a perfect time to get this done, but there is no one currently available to provide the required permits or inspections to move forward. As our property manager noted, had she foreseen this crisis, which of course no one could, she would have applied more pressure to get the required permits. Even with this, would anyone be available to do it?

With all the personal concerns we all have; we still have each other. I ask you to help those around you who need it. Now is the time we can use our American ingenuity to develop activities that can be done within the current guidelines. ELS has mandated that all common areas are off limits, but that only limits us to using those areas. Small groups gathering at a personal residence to play cards in a carport, or a screened in Florida room, for example could fall within the restrictions.

Thank you for your attention to this.

## Gloria Buehrig is a Beacon Terrace Original Treasure

It was July of 1983 when Gloria and Howard Buehrig began looking for a place to retire in Central Florida. They said to each other that they were "Just Looking" as both of them were still working. They looked at several parks in the area and at the last park they visited, they mentioned that there was one more park to look at. It was Beacon Terrace in Lakeland. The person they talked with said, "You'll buy there!"

They insisted that they were "Just Looking".

Well, they looked at Beacon Terrace and bought #26. Then they went back to Buffalo, NY to resume work. In October of that year they retired and became full time residents.

Beacon Terrace at the time was an "Adult Park" with the youngest age being 40. This was later changed to be over 55 when some in their 40s had small children and were looking to move in here.

There were only 128 lots with the end being Heather Street. Lot 1 was the office and the clubhouse was about half as big as it is now. Every house had a palm tree.

In 1984 the park began expanding to the size you see today. They wanted to expand the clubhouse and Gloria was on a committee to add the main room you see today. After visiting several parks, they were advised not to have the room as is in other parks with the dance floor at one end and all the seating at the other. So that is how we got a room with the dance floor in the middle and seating on both sides.

The park has had bazaars since the mid 80's and has always had Potlucks and Bingo.

Howard passed away in 1990, but Gloria remains and after 37 years wants to always be a resident in what she calls, "The best park around!"

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
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## Love Letters Written from A Trip Never Taken

Being away from my husband, Sam, for 35 days seemed unimaginable, but I had intentionally scheduled back-to-back family and work events, including a trip to Israel, so that I wouldn't be flying back and forth to Ohio.

Previously, I had been separated from Sam for two weeks at a time while training community health workers in other states. He proved that he could survive with less-than-healthy meals, unwashed clothes, and a disorganized house. But this longer separation had me a bit worried: what if he began to enjoy his new bachelorhood?

So, my solution? A love letter prepared ahead for each of the days that I would be gone. I purchased several romantic cards – a few funny ones, too – and pulled out old stationary so that I had enough correspondence. I also bought some small candy treats to include with the letters.



Several weeks before leaving for Ohio, I began to write the letters that I would leave for him. I thought it would be difficult to think of original content for 35 notes, but my pen flowed! Using my Israel trip itinerary, I described what I would be seeing that particular day. March 12: "Today we are to visit Caesarea. The Roman era beach-lined aqueducts, intact tiered amphitheater, and port ruins give me my first impression of the deep history of this nation."

As I completed each note, I dated the envelope so that there was a letter for each day in an intentional sequence. Then I filled a large glass bowl with the array of different sizes and colors of cards.

On the day that I left for Ohio, I gave instructions to Sam to only open the letter with the correct date on that day, and not to read ahead. He was surprised at the gesture and, of course, asked how much I had spent on the cards. I reassured him that he was worth it and that I always kept stationary and notecards on hand.

I flew out of Tampa with anticipation about the events that drew me to Ohio: my mother's 90<sup>th</sup> birthday, the video production of a health series, the trip to Israel, and a week of health worker training.

March 1, 2020 – Day one of my time away from my husband, and day one of opening the letters.. He opened a note card that included a photo of us taken in a French restaurant in Ybor City. I had written my thoughts about the adventure, a wonderful experience full of humor and delight.

That night I called him to see if he remembered to open the card. He did. He liked it. We talked about the seafood crepes at the restaurant and laughed about the photo taken by a stranger who had just bought the instamatic camera.

And so the days passed, cards were opened, phone calls were frequent. A scrapbook of memories unfolded through the messages, photos, and endearments. March 14—"We are at the Sea of Galilee where we will board a fishing boat like the one used by the disciples. We are walking almost 5 miles a day as we visit ancient sites."

March 15—"Today we visit we visit the caves of Qumran where the Dead Sea Scrolls were found by a shepherd. I would search all of the caves for you, my treasure.."

However, amidst my life events, national news began to focus more on the spread of COVID-19. My mother's 90<sup>th</sup> birthday party was held with only immediate family members at her home. The next day, I worked on the video lessons with health professionals who were alarmed about the virus. I then postponed the upcoming training program.

My last event, the trip to Israel, was still scheduled to leave Tuesday, March 10. It isn't until 12 hours before going to the airport that the Israeli government halted travel into the country for people not quarantined for 14 days. The trip was finally canceled.

I returned to Florida weeks earlier than planned. Still, Sam continued to read the cards that reflected on a trip not taken. The letters ended on March 28. I won't be traveling internationally any time soon, but maybe I should continue writing Sam notes from trips not taken. "Day I from Tahiti, I walk the sandy beach with sweet thoughts of you . . . ."

## The Joys of a BT Home Kitchen Renovation

Our kitchen had an island with laminate *held on with masking tape*. Masking tape! There were also cupboards hanging from the ceiling above the island, not to mention, of course, the oh-so- lovely 1984 look. As you all know though... renovations do not always go as planned.

We ordered a new dishwasher, cooktop and vent for above the stove on December 4<sup>th</sup> with a requested delivery of January 10<sup>th</sup>. We then started receiving emails notifying us that our purchase was getting delayed every few days. Yes... several emails telling us our purchase was delayed. A few phone calls, a few visits to the store, and every time we were assured we would get our delivery – it wouldn't show up.

Needless to say this order was cancelled, and an order placed with an appliance store.

Luckily, our retired electrician friend was here visiting, and he tells us what to buy and replaces the breaker and wiring. Seventy dollars in parts and a dinner at the Outback. Bargain.

We now have our beautiful new island and lovely upper vent with a four-burner cooktop all up to code.

This project was started January 17th, completed March 11th. The remainder of the kitchen will just have to wait. The new island is perfect.

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




