Second Vaccination Brings Relief, Yet Caution

February 26 was a day of relief, yet caution for more than 230 BT residents receiving their second dose of the COVID-19 Moderna vaccine. The inoculation event had been delayed by a week due to bad weather in the North causing late delivery of the vaccine.



Those participating in the HOA-sponsored event, greeted each other – still at a distance - with reminders to continue to wear masks and avoid large, populated areas.

One resident stated, "I may have a bit of fever, some aches, and tiredness after this shot, but that way I'll know the vaccine is working."

HOA President, Don Kohnke, coordinated efforts with the Polk County Health Department. Pasco County nurses gave the injections, and National Guard members helped the BT volunteers carry out the planned effort.

Beacon Terrace was one of the few 55+ MHPs in Polk County where a clinic was held.

Annual Bazaar Adjusts for COVID Safety

Like everything else at BT, the Annual Bazaar has undergone some big changes due to the COVID-19 Pandemic. The event has been moved back two weeks from the usual first Saturday of March — now set on the 20th from 8:00-a.m. to 12 noon. Preparation days are Wednesday-Friday the 17-19. BT residents ON-LY may shop on Friday 5:00 to 6:30 p.m.


The biggest adjustment is that the bazaar will be held outside, rather than in the Clubhouse to allow for safer exposure with the public.

The event will be held on Poinsettia Street, the one that runs perpendicular to the mailbox area. The street will be closed to through traffic from 8:00 am to 5:00 pm on Wednesday and Thursday. Then closed to ALL traffic Friday 8:00 am until Saturday 1:00 pm.

Organizers, led by HOA President Don Kohnke and Bev Furno, will have tables set up in volunteers' carports and driveways. Bev states, "Workers with golf carts will be allowed all days....so be alert when walking the street."

Donations may be dropped off across from the USPS mailboxes on Wednesday --Friday mornings. They are not taking any shoes and only men's "gently used" shirts and shorts. Please drop off any plastic or cloth bags, newspapers or small to medium boxes you might have at Lot #64 by the front steps.

In February we started conducting ELS Property Inspections. This was a process that was conducted many years ago and slowly disappeared over time.

Two groups consisting of one board member and one volunteer resident went around their areas of concern and noted things in need of repair or maintenance. One team inspected the common areas, roads, and outside of ELS buildings. The second team inspected inside the buildings and pool area. The lists were then shared with the manager for her to evaluate.



The Activity Center on the island has been used quite a bit since it was refurbished by the HOA. Please remember to keep it clean. If you use it, please clean it. Don't leave your dirt for the next group. It can't take but a few minutes to clean up your garbage and sweep the floor. Please remember to empty your garbage cans into the city garbage containers on the island. Thank You.

Many of you have commented and expressed gratitude for the Covid Clinic arranged by the President, Don Kohnke, with the help of the HOA Board and many volunteers. Given the difficulties of so many folks looking to be vaccinated in Lakeland, it was so convenient and comfortable to simply drive to the club house at an arranged time and be done with it! Everyone in the park was personally invited to participate and the forms needed were delivered to their homes, all at no personal cost!

Also, very recently, we all received the current Directory of all the homes and folks in the park with addresses, phone numbers and email addresses. What a valuable resource at our finger tips. Again, this undertaking was completed through the Board and volunteers.

These two major projects had financial consequences. The Clinic required the printing of all the forms which were distributed twice and a sign of gratitude for all the nurses, National Guard members and others who mixed the vaccine etc. with lunches for them all. The Directories too not only needed to be updated and appropriate information provided but also needed to be printed and collated.

Each of these projects were in excess of \$500.00! As you know there are many other issues every year addressed by the Board but their primary responsibility is to represent all of us to the Corporation which owns the park through the manager on site. So, there are monthly management meetings and of course Board meetings in preparation for our HOA meetings, to say nothing of all the meetings required to prepare ourselves for the many projects that arise.

Annual membership dues are \$15.00 per home. As of this date there are 60 members who have paid for 2021. That is a total of \$900.00. The two projects mentioned have already exceeded the dues paid.

If you judge and feel that the work of the Board is important please consider joining the HOA since everyone in the park benefits from the efforts made. You can do this by attending the March meeting on the 9th where we will be collecting dues or by writing a check to the HOA and putting it in my box in the club house. A receipt will be placed in your box.

A Florida Notary Public is a state public officer whose function is to: administer oaths, take acknowledgments of deeds and other instruments, attest to or certify photocopies of certain documents, and perform other duties specified by law.

Notaries are authorized by law to perform six basic duties:

- 1. Administer oaths or affirmations
- 2. Take acknowledgements
- 3. Attest to photocopies of certain documents
- 4. Solemnize marriages
- 5. Verify vehicle identification numbers (VINs)
- 6. Certify the contents of safe deposit boxes

I would like to remind everyone that ELS is still enforcing social distancing, mask wearing. Currently, we are still under the capacity limits as well. I appreciate all the cooperation with each of you.

Sending a BIG thank you all in these tough times, that are seeming to become the new NORMAL.

Please mark your calendars for the food donation on the third Tuesday of each month @ 9:00am. (See article on page 13). We want to also advise this donation is made possible by Humana Marketpoint. To continue to receive this benefit we need the residents to come to the clubhouse and sit and listen to the presentation that is provided through Humana and then pick up your donation. Delivery is not the intention.

I will be completing 360° inspections beginning the second week of March. March 8th will begin this process until complete. Be aware that a few items that we will be on the look for are:

- * Things growing in the gutters
- * Green Mildew on the outside of the homes
- * Paint needing to be refreshed
- * Driveway pressure washed
- * Weed overgrowth in flower beds
- * Items clutter around the exterior of the home.
- * House numbers visible from the roadway.

Please note that this is not a form of targeting anyone this is an annual requirement to keep your community a desirable living environment. If you are not able to meet the expectation, please communicate the issue with me so we can meet a resolution.

The office will be completing file audits. The emergency contact form that was placed in each mailbox should be returned to the office immediately.

It is very important that we can contact in case of emergency each resident. So, email and phone numbers should be updated when there is a change. Each file should contain all residence and occupants living in the home along with a background check on all. We should have a Drivers license or Photo ID for all residents and occupants.

Titles to the home should be included in the file. If someone who lives within the home has passed away, the office is required to retain a copy of the death certificate. Please be mindful of this as you may be asked for some of this information and this request is because it is not currently in the file.

After Covid-19 Vaccinations, Something

The day has finally come. You've received the second dose of the Moderna Covid-19 vaccine! Does that mean you're free to go about life as you did before the pandemic once immunity kicks in?

Sorry, there is no immunity passport yet, experts told CNN. There are still safety precautions you need to follow in order to keep you, your loved ones and everyone else safe and protected from the deadly coronavirus.

Can I please stop wearing a face mask?

Let's "face" it: The answer is no. Try to think of a face mask as your new best friend, one that you plan to cherish and appreciate for a good, long time. Five reasons why:

1) It's not 100% protection.

Even the best of the currently available vaccines only offers up to 95% protection when you are fully immunized. That means there is a 5% chance you can catch the coronavirus at any time.

2) Everyone's different.

Some people are going to mount more robust immune responses to both rounds of the Covid-19 vaccination than others. That's one of the key reasons experts are insisting everyone receive the second shot of the vaccine within a key time frame.

Remember, it can take two to three weeks after you get the second shot before your immunity fully kicks in.

3) A moving target.

The virus is mutating around the world creating variants that are proving to be more contagious than those the US is currently battling. It is unknown if the vaccinations will be effective on the variants.

4) You could be a silent spreader.

It's still possible that someone could get the vaccine but could still be an asymptomatic carrier. They may not show symptoms, but they have the virus in their nasal passageway so that if they're speaking, breathing, sneezing and so on, they can still transmit it to others.

5) Will immunity last?

Researchers don't yet know just how long the immunity given by the current vaccines will last. There is a possibility that booster doses may be needed in the months or years to come. That's not uncommon -- adults need tetanus and diphtheria boosters every 10 years. So, until more is known about how long the protection lasts, stay safe and protect others by wearing a mask.

When can I hang out with friends and family?

That depends on everyone's vaccine status, experts say. If friends or other members of your family have also received both doses of a Covid-19 vaccine, the risk is greatly reduced, especially if the visit is outdoors. It's probably pretty safe to see others who were also vaccinated, after everyone gets both doses and waits a few weeks. However, if the visit is indoors, there is going to be some level of risk.

And again, just because you've been vaccinated, that doesn't reduce your responsibility. You should continue to wear a mask and practice social distancing whenever you are around others.

"You wouldn't want to engage in activities where you could potentially acquire the novel coronavirus and then transmit it to others," Dr. Leana Wen said.

That includes seeing other people who are vaccinated, but not wearing a mask — based on what we know now, they could have the virus and pass it onto you, and you could pass it onto the people you live with. An abundance of caution is still a good idea."

We Should All Understand

When can I eat at an indoor restaurant or go to a concert or sporting event?

Indoor restaurants are likely hotspots for Covid-19 transmission. That's partly because no one is wearing a mask while they eat, thus spreading their respiratory droplets around as they socialize.

Other reason? Most restaurants do not have effective filtration equipment on their circulation systems, leaving the air poorly ventilated and a prime breeding ground for virus spread. So even with a second vaccine, you're still taking a chance that you might be exposed and become a silent spreader.

But won't the typical 6-foot spread between tables or booth partitions do the trick?

The 6-foot spread indoors may not be enough by itself. You must have good ventilation in that establishment. Even a HEPA filter wouldn't be totally effective since most transmission takes place in close contact type of scenarios where you're near someone. The HEPA filter doesn't help with that.

What about fun things to do, such as concerts and sporting events?

Once vaccinated, an outdoor sporting event or concert is probably safe, if there is good social distancing between households and everyone is wearing masks. Indoor, crowded gatherings are probably still best to avoid even if you're vaccinated.

Can I travel if I've been vaccinated?

"I want to emphasize that now is not the time to be traveling period, internationally or domestically, it's just not a good time to be traveling," said Dr. Rochelle Walensky, the CDC's new director. And that applies to people who have already been vaccinated, added Dr. Fauci.

"Getting vaccinated does not say now I have a free pass to travel," Fauci said at the CNN global town hall. "Nor does it say that I have a free pass to put aside all of the public health measures that we talk about all the time."

"I mean, if you absolutely have to travel and it's essential, then obviously, one would have to do that. But we don't want people to think because they got vaccinated, then other public health recommendations just don't apply," Fauci said.

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
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
